ten years ago in 1936, has there been a sporting event of the magnitude that brought 120,000 cheering spectators to Berlin's Olympic Stadium September 7 and 8. The event—The Allied Forces Sports Council Track and Field Champion—ship Meet featured the picked soldier—athletes of eight Allied Armies correcting for European supremacy in track and field sports. These nations, Belgium, France, Luxembourg, Holland, Great Britain, Czechoslovakia, Denmark and the United States, put on a two day athletic event that saw many ET records fall.

The meet, arranged by the Allied Forces Sports Council, was sponsored by the United States Army and organized by the Athletic Branch of Theater Special Services. The success of the Berlin meet, as evidenced by the cheering reaction of the throngs who attended and by the reactions of the participating athletes show that the Allied Forces Sports Council,

Although there were, according to Olympic Rules, no actual scores kept, the United States Army team, as usual, acquitted itself in a commendable fashion. The exciting

part about this great event, however was the fact that each nation competing managed to star in one or more particular events. Czechoslovakia, who sent one man to the meet, won the 5000 meter run in almost Olympic time, and little Luxembourg, with her four man team placed in this big-time competition.

Great Britain entered a strong team. France too, added to her laurels and Belgium and Holland were placed in this Inter-Allied Meet.-

The meet started with ceremonies reminiscent of prewar Olympics. The brilliant flash of many uniforms and massed national flags lent a great splash of color, while the music of six trumpeters, chosen from Belgian bands, played in the ceremonies. These trumpeters heralded the arrival of General Joseph T. McMarney, Commanding General of the United States Forces in the European Theater as he was escorted to the field by Major General A.R. Bolling. Theater Chief of Special Services for the European Theater. After the arrival of General McHarney and his party, the trumpeters heralded the arrival of the runner carrying the torch whick ignited the Olympic flame which since the early days of the Greeks has always burned at Olympic festivals. The runner chosen to carry the torch was Sgt. Herman Winkler of the Bronx, N.Y., nineteen year old swimming champion and holder of several European Theater breast stroke records.

The meet was broadcast over the American Forces Metwork in a theater-wide hook-up, by Lee Schulman from Munich
and Howard Reed from Berlin. In addition the British Forces Network relayed their broadcast throughout the British
Zone and then through the facilities of the British Broadcasting Corporation to listeners in the United Kingdom. The
American Forces Network in turn relayed the broadcast by
shortwave to the United States.

Head track judge for the meet was Lt. Col. C. H. Reimerth of Caspar, Yoming, Berlin District; while the head field judge was Mr. George Vilson of Evenston, Ill. of Theater Special Services. Head timer was Major F. Endresen, a member of the Norwegian Defense Ministry and head starter was Major "Hank" Anastasas of Beaumont, Texas.

Col. Russell T. Finn of Peoria, Ill., chairman of the Allied Forces Council supervised the efforts of the personnel responsible for the promotion and management of the meet.

Col. Finn is chief of the Athletic Branch of Theater Special Services.

Other officials were Major H. E. Link of Seattle, Washing-ton, meet manager and organizer; Capt. James Roy of Baton Rouge, La., co-manager and organizer, both of the Athletic Branch of Theater Special Services.

It is expected that this great sports meet will be the predecessor of many more competitions between the Allied Forces.

The spirit in which all the participating nations entered the meet was splendid and although no world records were smashed, a number of contestants distinguished themselves by breaking already standing European Theater records.
