A farewell note

During its XXIIIrd General Assembly, the International Military Sports Council has decided to abandon its current publication program in favor of one better suited to the organization's requirements.

As of 1969, SPORT INTERNATIONAL will be published but once a year, at Christmas time. This annual issue — a detailed and richly illustrated year-book, at it were — will retrace CISM's activities during the year gone by and describe the program and calendar of the year to come.

« CISM NEWS », on the other hand, will henceforth be published monthly, both in English and in French. The bulletin will feature current events, the latest echos of CISM Life, scores and highlights of sports events, and a regular series of practical data.

Also graduating to the forefront will be the « TECHNICAL BROCHURES » which, through the combined effort of our Academy's most qualified specialists, will place the latest discoveries in the field of training and the many aspects of sports within the reach of all. They will constitute a valuable documentation for all who partake in the promotion of sports, be it in the capacity of technician, doctor, trainer, or coach, in other words all those engaged in the study of Man.

The Technical Brochures will be published quarterly.

Thus, after ten years of uninterrupted publication, our news magazine « SPORT INTERNATIONAL » will no longer go to press quarterly as in the past. We feel, however, that it has accomplished its mission, namely to serve the expansion of our organization — CISM's membership did double in the past ten years.

At this stage, our ever-growing organization needs above all to step up its program of activities and to revise its information service so as to provide for a faster tempo of publication and greater emphasis on technical data. Moreover, numerous military publications in our member nations now give our championships extensive and thorough reporting as well as photographic coverage.

SPORT INTERNATIONAL says good by for now, with the promise to return next Christmas.

In the meantime, all readers wishing to do so may apply for membership in CISM CLUB, which will make its issues of CISM NEWS and of the TECHNICAL BROCHURES available to them.


We hope that this new approach will meet with your approval and that our wide circle of Friends and Supporters will keep on growing.

The opening ceremony was honored with the presence of H.E. M. HADDON CHIGUER, Minister of Defense, while General BECHIR presided over the closing ceremony.


General K. G. WICKHAM, official CISM representative, spoke highly of the warm hospitality extended by Morocco and the truly friendly attitude displayed by all participants.





The 4 × 10 km team event was spectacular. With the addition of Shooting, it will deserve a choice place on CISM's Calendar.






Every evening, highly competitive encounters drew 4 000 enthusiastic and knowledgeable onlookers.







Air Force teams of the following nations participated in the XVth International Military Aeronautic Pentathlon Championship: Denmark, Spain, Finland, France, Norway, Netherlands and Sweden.

Introduced in 1948 with a view to encouraging physical fitness training for the pilots, P. A. I. M. slowly lost ground through force of circumstance; the evolution of machinery, and the transition from the conventional prop to the modern jet aircraft have altered the training requirements.

However, thanks to a few determined colonels, P. A. I. M. resumed its activities with the added incentive that is program might be modernized and perhaps reoriented.

From 3 to 9 July, 13 nations gathered in the close vicinity of the Parthenon for what turned out to be the consecration of the success of our Track & Field championships. The 13 participants were: Germany, Belgium, Ivory Coast, United States, Ethiopia, France, Greece, Iraq, Lebanon, Morocco, Tunisia and Turkey.

One observer: Kuwait.

This was Ethiopia's first time participation in one of our championships. The opening ceremony was presided by the Vice Prime Minister in the presence of 25,000 spectators, while 35,000 onlookers attended the last day of the event.

Do take a fast look at the list of winners in this championship — you will find that many a name has since appeared on the Honor Roll in

Mexico. It is one of CISM's traditions.

CISM Championships have served as proving grounds for many a celebrity. In 1946, the limelight focused on ZATOPEK; in 1956, WILLIAMS and MURCHINSON bettered the world record for the 100 meter dash with a time of 10"01.

In 1960, in Brussels, SYLVESTER broke the world record in the discus throwing event, Jazy, Roelants, Ottoz, and many others first came to

the world's attention during CISM championships.

Sponsored by Greece, the motherland of the Olympics, the 1968 championship reaffirmed the value of military track events, their regard for decorum and their respect for the athlete. The remarkable spirit of goodwill, which is the trademark of track events, prevailed throughout the championship.

The current Greek Delegation has done a wonderful job of taking over the responsibility previously assumed by Colonel N. PAPARESCOS



Then came the series of gruelling contests: the obstacle course saw the victory of the Dutch team. The technical course, faithfully adapted to the requirements of the seaman's trade, proved very popular and drew a large public. The swimming event went to the United States, while Norway competed its way to victory in the Amphibious-Cross.

The final classification for team and individual performance revealed the most welcome, if unexpected success of the United States team.

The Italien oarsmen were pratically unchallenged, while in the Sailing contest (Dragon), Broberg (Sweden) took the lead over an astonishing runner up, Maioforte (Brazil) who is a truly gifted beginner. On the basis of the scores, it is not presumptious to herald that with participants hailing from Brazil, the United States, and European countries, Ski Week is making great strides forward.

Everything points to a further increase in participation. The Dutch Royal Navy certainly deserves our thanks.

The United States stole the show

The Championship, which drew the participation of 13 nations, was held in the ultra-modern facilities of the Fontaine-bleau Interservice Sports School.

The final classification read as follows: U. S. A. - Finland - France - Italy - Sweden - Romania - Greece - Denmark - Netherlands - Belgium - Turkey and Austria. The United States contestants clearly demonstrated their superiority in this event. All CISM records were shattered while three world records were broken and two equalled in certain Olympic disciplines, namely:

Free Carbine, 50 meters - prone position (40 rounds):

KRILLING (USA) and TESTARMATA (Italy) ... 399 pts Free Carbine, 50 meters - kneeling position (40 rounds):

KRILLING (USA) 394 pts Free Carbine, 50 meters - standing position (40 rounds):

LANDRO (Norway 376 pts (World record tied).

In the three position contest, KRILLING scored a total of 1,161 pts, thus closing in on the World Record of his countryman WIGGER (1,164 pts).

Combat rifle, 300 meters: WHITAKER (USA) 561 pts

The undisputed star of this championship was MARGARET THOMSON, W. A. C. Captain, U. S. A. In the free carbine (standing position) event, she came within a point of the world record and her classification in the three shoulder-weapon contests (free carbine: second with 1,158 pts, combat rifle at 300 mtr: second with 555 pts for precision and third for speed, with 495 pts) needs no additional comment.

All the contestants — of which more than thirty have participated in the Rome and Tokyo Olympic Games as well as in the Cairo and Wiesbaden World Championships — made it a point to voice their congratulations to the organizers of the event.



And mighty well at that, for the time has almost come to devise a less commonplace challenge than that of accurately touching a target.

As things stand, the margins of error have become practically unnoticeable.

What is soaring is the quota of participation. As is the case for several other CISM constests, the increase is illustrated by the presence of teams from the United States, Brazil, Vietnam, and Iraq. Dispersion in this context is a very welcome phenomenon which serves to further heighten interest in this championship reserved for those true soldier-athletes: the paratroopers.

THE CHAMPIONSHIP:

- The Spanish Air Force provided the organizing Committee with 2 « Caribous », 2 « Augusta-Beli » Helicopters, 1 « Dornier ».
- The opening and closing ceremonies were presided by Major General M. Sagardoy and Lt General Prado Castro, respectively, both in the presence of 10,000 spectators.
- The scores were exceptionally high due to the great skill of participating teams.
- The Air Ministry awarded the title of «Fighter Paratrooper» honoris-causa of the Spanish Army to all the participants.

A single melancholic note: this was the last championship to be presided by Major General M. Sagardoy, Chief of the Spanish Delegation, who is relinquishing this function.

Under his leadership, the Spanish Delegation became an example of stamina and initiative in undertaking the sponsorship of numerous championships such as Track & Field, Swimming, Soccer, and Cross-Country, as well as the XXIInd General Assembly.



The ancient creed of our country rested on three principles:


UPRIGHTNESS OF THOUGHT, SPEECH, AND ACTION.

The optimum harmony between spiritual and corporal power cannot find a better expression.






FARL-EAST ZONE






